Congratulations on your admission as a postgraduate student at UCT Law, whether as a doctoral or masters research candidate, or in one of our School for Advanced Legal Studies (SALS) LLM, MPhil, or PG Diploma programmes!

On **Tuesday, 11 February**, all postgraduate students (i.e. PG diploma, professional masters students, coursework and minor dissertation students, and research masters and doctoral candidates) are expected to attend. Join us for lunch in the Pius Langa quad.

On **Wednesday, 12 February**, SALS students who intend to do an LLM by coursework with a minor dissertation, as well as research masters and doctoral candidates are expected to attend (i.e. professional masters and PG diploma students are not expected to attend).

On **Thursday, 13 February**, doctoral students are expected to attend. Research masters students may attend.


